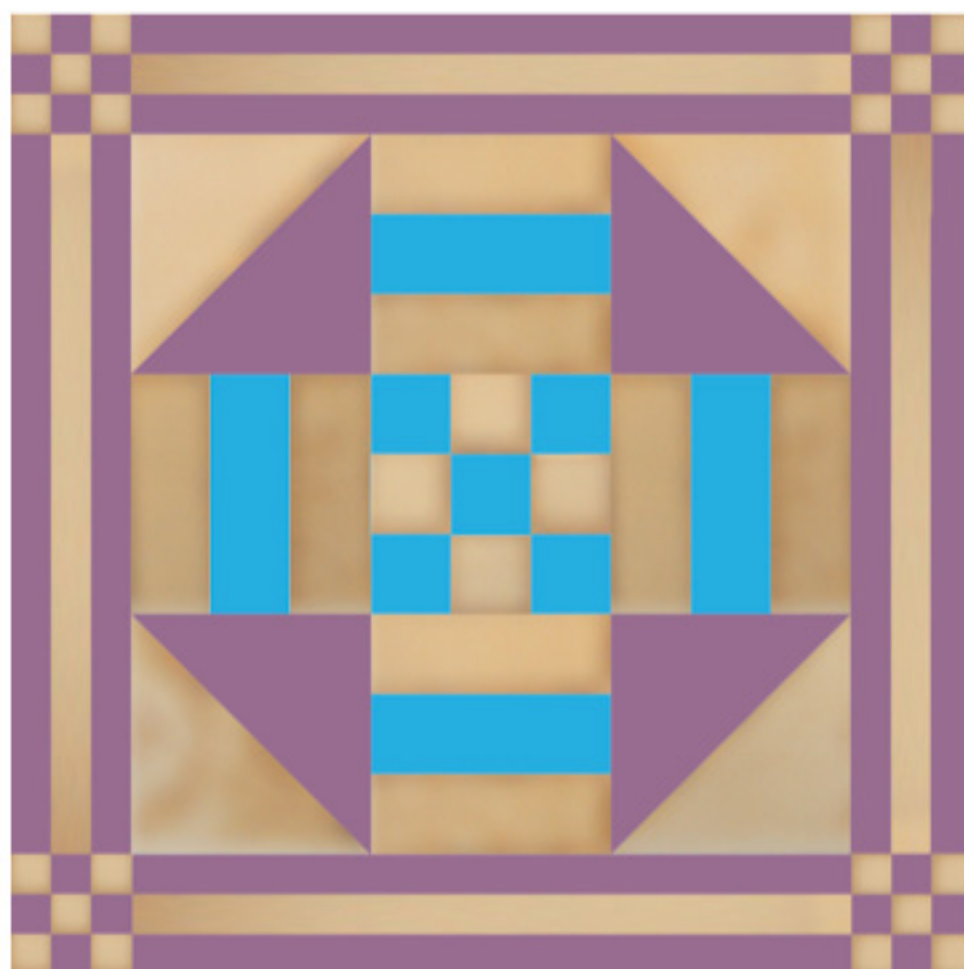


The Churn Dash (var.) Quilt

Will make a lap size quilt of aprox. 60"x60"



Instructions for cutting and assembling The Churn Dash (variation) Quilt[©]

One Block Only Beginner Quilting[©]

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Materials Needed

Dark Fabric	1½ yards (48 inches)
Light fabric	1/2 yard (18 inches)
Background Fabric	1½ yards (60 inches)
Thread to match (white, natural or match #2 print)	1 spool

Backing 42" fabric	2 yards
Batting	enough for a 60x60 quilt

Mini-Blocks Used: "Pinwheels", "Tri-Squares" and 4-Patch



Cutting Instructions

You will be cutting the fabrics in this manner:

(Illustrations on unfolded fabric)

Ignore the spacings in the illustrations → when cutting the pieces.

Dark Fabric:

with folded fabric cut four strips (8)
 $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 46\frac{1}{2}''$ (for borders), set aside

With the remaining fabric, iron flat:

Dark Fabric:

cut two squares $16''$ square for
big Tri-Sqs

Strips for small squares:

cut four strips $3''$ wide that will be cut into $3''$ squares. There should be sixteen squares total.



Lighter Fabric:

With unfolded ironed flat fabric cut two
 $5\frac{1}{2}''$ strips across the fabric. Then cut four
rectangles $5\frac{1}{2}'' \times 16''$

Cut one strip $5\frac{1}{2}''$ wide to be then cut
into $5\frac{1}{2}''$ squares. Make 5 squares.

Background Fabric:

Ignore the spacings in the illustrations → when cutting the pieces.

with folded fabric cut two strips (4)
 $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 46\frac{1}{2}''$ (for borders), set aside

With the remaining fabric, iron flat:

Background Fabric:

cut two squares $16''$ square for
big Tri-Sqs

Strips for small squares:

cut five strips $3''$ wide that will
be cut into $3''$ squares. There
should be twenty squares total.

Cut the short rectangles ($5\frac{1}{2}'' \times 16''$) from the remaining fabric as
shown (cut side by side, ignore spaces).

Finally, cut four $5\frac{1}{2}''$ squares.



Sewing and additional cutting Instructions

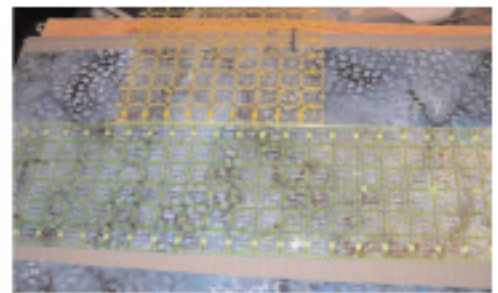
Sew together the short strips. (Make four.) Background, light fabric, background, press toward the center strip and trim to $15\frac{1}{2}''$ length.

At this time you may sew together the border strips and set aside (you will trim these strips later).

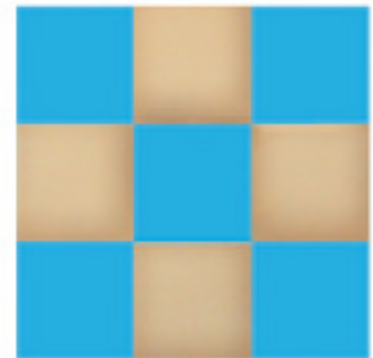
Cutting Strips of Fabric:

The Center 9-Patch. For chain stitching, pin together one light $5\frac{1}{2}$ " square to one $5\frac{1}{2}$ " background square for three sets and sew together. Then pin the remaining squares to each set matching Illustration 2 and sew. Press the seams to the light fabric. Assemble the first row to the second row, and press. Sew the second row and third row together.

The Corner 9-Patches. Follow the instructions above using the small 3" squares. Make four blocks.

Tri-Squares

Follow the instructions in the Mini-Block Booklet. Once assembled, trim the finished square to $15\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Sewing the Quilt Top together

The Main block: sew one Tri-Sq., one Strip, and one Tri-Sq. The second row consists of one strip, the center 9-patch, and another strip. The third row is the same as the first row. Sew all these combinations together, press. Assemble the rows as above. Press seams toward center.

Adding the borders: sew two of the border strips to the main quilt top. Trim to the size of the quilt top. Match the edges of the quilt and trim the border strips to the main quilt top's size. Sew a corner 9-patch to each end, carefully matching the seams, pin and sew together. Pressing the seams toward the dark fabric.

Now the quilt is ready to finish by sandwiching the back and top with batting. Then tie the quilt on hand or machine quilt to finish the quilt.
